

Refreshment for our Journey through Life

While the word 'journey' is often overused when talking about our personal relationships, careers, or events in our everyday lives, it is the perfect choice for describing the events of Holy Week and Easter which take us on a spiritual journey that reflects our life, however old or young we may be.

Our journey to Easter begins with celebrating the physical and spiritual journey that Jesus made with his followers as they travelled to, and arrived in, Jerusalem on what today is best known as Palm Sunday. The day recalls the spiritual and the physical journey that took Jesus to Jerusalem for his sacrificial death, and, in doing so, reminds us of our personal spiritual and physical journey through life.

Palm Sunday marks the start of Holy Week and is observed with special solemnity as a time of devotion to the Passion of Jesus Christ. In the Greek and Roman liturgical books, it is called the Great Week because great deeds were done by God during this week.


Our journey leads us to Maundy Thursday when many churches meet for an evening Communion service. In some traditions, the service concludes with 'the stripping of the altar' when all moveable items are removed from the church, including altar cloths, bibles, decorative crosses, candles, and flowers. They are replaced with a simple wooden cross.

The next day, Good Friday, is a time for quiet meditation. In our town, Christians Together In Fareham participate in a Service of Witness at the Podium in the Town Centre where there is a combined service of worship. Some Christians walk from their individual churches carrying a banner or a cross. This year this service is being led by Fareham URC. Thanks must be recorded to Fiona Corless for putting together the service and to all those who will be taking part. Please join us in this act of witness and worship. We will gather at the church at 10am to walk to the town centre.

All this is in preparation for Easter Eve on the following day when some Christians gather outside their church at sunset — in the Jewish tradition of Jesus, sunset marked the start of a new day. As darkness falls, the 'Easter Fire' is lit outside the church from which every member of the congregation lights a candle which is carried in procession into the dark church. The candles, representing Jesus, the light of the world, lights up the church and the first Holy Communion of Easter is a joyful celebration. In our church, on Easter Sunday, we celebrate the resurrection of our Lord in a service of Holy Communion at 8.15am, and at a Family service at 10.30am. Don't miss the Easter Breakfast at 9.15am!

Our personal journeys are not, of course, over. Our celebrations are like a welcome service station on a long journey, they refresh and energise us to continue on our way with enthusiasm and energy!



You can't get away from Portland

Henry Canova Vollam Morton FRSL (known as H. V. Morton), (26 July 1892 – 18 June 1979) was a journalist and pioneering travel writer from Lancashire. He was best known for his many books on London, Great Britain and the Holy Land. This is an extract from one of his books 'In Search of England'.

Thank you to Bronwyn Mason for sending it in.

"That," said the quarry foreman, as he included the landscape in a sweep if his hand, "is where St. Paul's came from!" I looked down towards the sea from a high cliff on the eastern side of the Isle of Portland. The foreman turned, pointing towards a cosy bay that lay between steep cliffs with the wave breaking on the shingle beach.

"Some of the City churches came out of that great hole! All these old quarries on the east side were worked by Sir Christopher Wren when he rebuilt London."



We walked on together over roads so white with powdered Portland stone that the dust clung like flour to our clothes and formed a grey film on our hands. My guide pointed to a long gash in the rock.

"The Cenotaph!" he remarked casually.

He went on.

"I helped to choose some of the stones for the Cenotaph" he continued, "the top ones with the wreath on them. We picked the purest white stone in the island" "Where is all this stone going?" I asked the foreman as we passed

between walls of it.

"That," he replied, "is Regent Street."

If you would like to examine the fossils in Portland Stone you will see many in the plinth of the King Charles statue at Charing Cross: it is full of sea shells. I thought in my vanity that I knew London.

I realise now that no one understands London till he has explored the significant chasms of this white island; this mother of London.

Somerset House, St Paul's, the Bank, the Royal Exchange, the Law Courts, the British Museum, all the Wren churches - have left their caves, gullies, arid gaps in the Isle of Portland. What an unforgettable experience it is to walk in the mighty bed from which, at the command of Wren, St Paul's rose to stand guard on Ludgate Hill.

And this I thought: that never again will I look on London with quite the same eyes. Always at the back of my mind will be, as I walk the streets of London, knowledge of a white island lying out to sea like a great whale. When I see Portland stone in London I shall think of the sea breaking against high hills; I shall hear the scream of the gulls, the suck back of pebbles on the little stony beaches; the white dust lying over the road in the mysterious Isle of London.

Because of Good Friday you can look back and not be afraid Because of Easter you can look ahead and not be afraid. Because of Ascension Day you can look up and not be afraid. Because of Pentecost you can look in and not be afraid.
